## **ART FROM THE MORRIS ROOM**

The eleventh painting I'm going to talk about is George Frederick Watt's 1899 painting, "Hope".

George Frederick Watt was one of the most famous British artists in the field of symbolic art. He's been know as "the painter of ideals". He was also a noted sculptor.

Born in London in 1817 of Welsh parents he began using artist materials at an early age and later painted many portraits. In his pictures Watts leaves to posterity a record of a decidedly brilliant career. He died in 1904.

On Sunday, August 9, 1976, Larry and Elizabeth Kitson took the bus to the Tate Gallery in London and were given special permission to view the original of this painting in the basement storage room. What a wonderful experience!

"Hope" is an allegorical painting symbolized by a young woman seated on top of the world. (An allegory is a story in which people, things and happenings have another meaning.)

In the Bible (Hebrews 6:19) hope is "an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast." In the painting, Hope is blindfolded, seated on a globe and playing the last string left on a lyre. Surmounting all is the guiding star of Hope. Watt explained, "Hope need not mean expectancy; it suggests that music can still come from the remaining chord." Even though everything has failed; yet 'Hope' gives still another chance; there is still a last string to play."

The whole painting is bathed in a soft blue green. The maid's costume is a more intense green, the symbolic colour for hope.

Surrounding the world are vaporous clouds which symbolize that the world is drifting, doubtful as to direction; in other words, puzzled as to purpose, yet holding strongly to Hope who is chained to the world.

Notice how beautifully the form is expressed through the soft green draperies and the particular beauty of the face, hands and feet - a tribute as well to Watt's skill as a sculptor.

It is a rare painting to stimulate our imaginations.
