MINISTER'S MESSAGE

General Assembly and the Rainbow Communion From June 3-6, 2018, I had the privilege and the responsibility of participating in the 144th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. It was held at Wilfred Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario with the theme "Glad and Generous Hearts."

The outgoing Moderator, the Rev. Peter Bush, preached honestly at the opening worship, and challenged the church with acknowledging and dealing with the deep divisions in our denomination. He noted that many of us "don't like each other" and he used 1 Corinthians 13 as a call to LOVE one another in the midst of conflict.

The Rev. Daniel Cho was elected as the new Moderator, and conducted the meeting very well, despite the fact that it was a challenging meeting with difficult and divisive topics to discuss. There were moments for worship throughout the Assembly, and the beginning and end of every sederunt, and this helped to create an atmosphere of worshipful work. The music and prayer selections were carefully chosen and responsive to what was happening in the meeting. The preachers were pretty good too. ③

I was very busy at the Assembly because the original plan was that I would be there as a resource person, not as a voting commissioner:

As Convenor of the Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations Committee, I presented a report which included recommendations encouraging local ecumenical and interfaith engagement, promoting the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and Interfaith Harmony Week, and the inviting congregations to learn more about Canadian Indigenous Spirituality.

I also introduced the Ecumenical Guest, the Rev. Dr. Willard Metzger, Executive Director of Mennonite Church Canada, and Mr. Balpreet Singh, legal counsel for the World Sikh Organization of Canada. Both presentations received very positive responses from commissioners. Willard Metzger's presentation included sharing about how the Mennonite Church moved towards a "local option" for conducting same-sex marriages, while agreeing not to change their doctrinal standards. Mr. Singh shared several stories as he told us about the Sikh Faith, and he also spoke about his work in human rights law and religious accommodation. He has not only worked to protect the religious freedom of Sikhs, but also many other faith groups.

I assisted with the introduction of a trial process of Consensus Decision-Making during the Monday evening sederunt. Although I don't think that it went as smoothly as it might have, I still believe that it could be a helpful process for moving us out of an adversarial process of decision-making in which argument is the mode of operation. The process includes using orange and blue cards to indicate whether you are warm or cool to an idea, and to help move towards consensus in a cooperative manner.

I was invited to preach for the Monday morning worship on Acts 4:32-37. My sermon was titled "Inconceivable" and can be found online at <u>http://curriejesson.ca/june-4-2018-144th-general-assembly-of-the-pcc/</u>.

I agreed to serve as a Chaplain to Commissioners, with particular emphasis on availability to listen and support people during the challenging discussions about human sexuality. Once I became a commissioner, my availability for this became somewhat limited as I was quite engaged in the discussion on the floor. However, I did have three individuals come to me for support and prayer during the Assembly.

Finally, during the Assembly, I was asked by the Rev. Jean Morris if I would become a "Listener" for the Rainbow Communion's work over the course of the next year. I would be available as a second person to listen (together with Jean) for individuals from Saskatchewan wanting to share their stories in person. I think this may be the most important thing that happened at the General Assembly this year. The Rainbow Communion's terms of reference were adjusted, those participating in the process were assured of their safety (in that their sharing is guaranteed not to result in censure by the courts of the church), and the work of the Rainbow Communion was ready to begin.

The mandate of the Rainbow Communion is:

To offer a safe and respectful environment in which confidentiality is assured, in order to encourage people

- to tell stories of harm done to them within and by the church because of homophobia, heterosexism and transphobia; and
- to share stories of God's grace experienced by them and through them in Christian ministry, even in the midst of the challenges they have faced.

To invite people to submit their stories orally or in writing (face-to-face, video conference, phone call, email, traditional mail, or other means). Stories of those who have given permission to share them may be included in the committee's report to a future General Assembly.

To provide, after the listening process is completed, an appropriate response to the issue of homophobia within The Presbyterian Church in Canada with recommendations for concrete actions addressing homophobia to the General Assembly for implementation within the church.

I believe that this is very important work, and I am pleased to be a part of it. I would encourage everyone who has a story to share to be in touch with the Rainbow Communion. Right now, we are just finishing Regina's celebration of Pride Week, with the Pride Parade

on Saturday, June 16th. Last weekend I attended a panel presentation at Wesley United Church in which three young women (one Roman Catholic, one Jewish, and one Muslim) shared about the intersection of their faith and their sexual orientation, with each one identifying as lesbian or queer. It was a remarkable presentation, with these women sharing so openly and honestly about the struggles they have experienced in their faith communities and the challenges of living their faith as LGBTQ+ people. I was most encouraged by their resiliency and their determination not to give up on God and to live and serve as faithful people despite the challenges.

During this Pride Week, and as the work of the Rainbow Communion begins, I pray for all LGBTQ+ people in our community and in The Presbyterian Church in Canada. I pray that we can make all our churches safe and welcoming communities so that all people can experience the love and grace of God, and so that our churches will be blessed by the gifts of each and every child of God, regardless of sexual orientation.

WORLD REFUGEE DAY

World Refugee Day (June 20, 2018) is a day to honour the strength and courage of refugees and reflect on ways to help uprooted women, men, and children on their journey to find peace. Work with refugees is an important part of the ministry of Presbyterian World Service & Development (PWS&D), and at this time there is a special appeal for the Rohingya Refugees.

The plight of hundreds of thousands of Rohingya people has become the world's fastest growing refugee crisis. Since August 2017, unthinkable suffering caused by escalating violence in Myanmar's Rakhine state has forced over 700,000 Rohingya refugees into overcrowded settlements in Bangladesh, where necessities like food, shelter, and sanitation are extremely limited. The approaching monsoon season will worsen an already dire living situation – flooding and landslides could demolish temporary shelters and exacerbate illness. On this World Refugee Day, stand with Rohingya refugees. Pray for their safety and help ease their suffering by supporting relief efforts through PWS&D that address food, water and sanitation, shelter, emergency medical care, and psychosocial assistance.

<u>Bible Verses for World Refugee Day</u> (From Biblegateway.com)

According to The UN Refugee Agency, around the world nearly 20 people are forcibly displaced every minute as a result of conflict or persecution. An unprecedented 65.6 million people globally have been forced from their homes. Among them are nearly 22.5 million refugees, over half of whom are under the age of 18. There are also 10 million stateless people who are denied a nationality and access to basic rights such as education, healthcare, employment, and freedom of movement.

What does the Bible say about helping defenseless and vulnerable people in need?

Don't oppress an immigrant. You know what it's like to be an immigrant, because you were immigrants in the land of Egypt. <u>Exodus 23:9 (CEB)</u>

"When a stranger sojourns with you in your land, you shall not do him wrong. You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." <u>Leviticus 19:33-34 (ESV)</u>

"The sin of your sister Sodom was this: She lived with her daughters in the lap of luxury—proud, gluttonous, and lazy. They ignored the oppressed and the poor. They put on airs and lived obscene lives. And you know what happened: I did away with them." <u>Ezekiel 16:49</u> (<u>MSG</u>)

Being kind to the poor is like lending to the Lord. The Lord will reward you for what you have done. <u>Proverbs 19:17 (ICB)</u>

For the poor shall never cease out of the land: therefore, I command thee, saying, Thou shalt open thine hand wide unto thy brother, to thy poor, and to thy needy, in thy land. <u>Deuteronomy</u> <u>15:11 (KJV)</u> [Jesus] said to him, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and most important command. The second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets depend on these two commands." <u>Matthew 22:37-40 (CSB)</u>

SESSION

As activities wind down towards summer, we bring another busy year to an end.

- It's hard to believe that Amanda will complete her first year with us at the end of July! It has been a wonderful year and we are really thankful to have Amanda and Nick with us!
- The organ project is mostly completed now. There will be some more fine-tuning done in August and then it will be finished. Thank you to Hart Godden and Will Ireton for all the work you have done over the last two weeks! Thank

you to Bill for organizing everything! And thanks again to the many volunteers who helped out during the first week - it was a huge help and with so many working, it went quickly! To date, we have received \$7425 of the \$9000 goal for this project. Thank you for your generous donations! To make a donation, you can include it in your regular offering envelope, but mark Organ under special projects.

- At the annual meeting, the Board was encouraged to arrange more rentals of our facilities. As an answer to prayer, two large rentals emerged during the month following. A volleyball association has arranged to rent the gym for a week in August and Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday evenings from November to May, which will generate about \$4000. A group starting a Muslim school for 15-20 Grade 1 and 2 students approached First Church about renting the Kennedy Room during the week (avoiding Tuesday morning), with some use of the gym. If the requirements of the City of Regina (zoning) and the Dept of Education can be met, we could potentially have a rental of about \$14,000 next year.
- Our committees have been busy with a variety of activities throughout the year and we thank everyone who contributed their time and effort to the ministry of First Church!

There are a number of things I want to share with you as we look ahead to the fall.

 Our Vacation Bible School will be held Aug. 20
23 in the mornings (9 - 12). We encourage our parents to register their children (online at vbspro.events/p/events/firstregina2018 or call Shirley in the office.) We also need volunteers for registration in the morning and snacks.

- We hope to again have a Value Village FUNDrive in the fall, with the date still to be arranged. But, as you clean out closets this summer, start saving bags of clothing, small household items and books.
- At our annual meeting a year ago, refugee sponsorship of Nyabani Ngor's family was approved. But it is a long process. PWS&D of our church has approved including our family in their quota for this year. Currently the completion of forms for Canada Immigration and Citizenship is under way and then we wait. But we are going to launch our appeal in the fall to raise money for the sponsorship. In October we will hold a Global Potluck dinner on Oct. 28 where we encourage you to bring food from your heritage. More information will be coming out about that event in the fall.
- Sometime in the fall we will be having a presbytery visitation again, but the date is to be determined.
- The Session has approved sending a team from First Church to "Transform", an event hosted by Canadian Ministries and Stewardship & Planned Giving of our national church in Orillia Nov. 8-11. Funding will be provided from our Daring in our Outreach Fund. "Transform the way you live as leaders, congregations and ministries." The Rev. Dr. Grace Kim will be the inspirational keynote speaker, with a missional focus. Workshops will be shared by congregations that have experienced success in stewardship, discipleship development, community engagement and more. These will provide our team with an opportunity to consider concrete ways for our congregation to move forward. If you are interested in participating, please let Amanda know.
