It was the news of his father's death many years later that finally brought Bill home again.

graduation - in the exact amount of the car they had chosen together.

As I think about this story, I can't help but wonder how many people in this world have done the same thing to God... literally tossed aside a wonderful promise, because they didn't understand it, or they didn't believe that it is possible. In our world, we are taught that; "if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is." And that's a good lesson. It doesn't take long before we have been fooled enough to know that the world's promises are full of nothing but emptiness. But, God is different. Instead of promises full of emptiness, on Easter, God gave us emptiness (in the form of a tomb); that is full of promise.

The Lenten season arrived early this year and once again we have relied on families to take part in the Lenten readings at the beginning of each service. We decided to continue the practice of lighting seven candles at the beginning of the service. There is a candle for each Sunday of Lent and one for Good Friday. One candle is extinguished at the end of each reading leaving the seventh to be put out on Good Friday, signifying the light of Christ disappearing from the World. On Easter Sunday the Christ Candle is lit again, with the return of the light of Christ in the world.

You will have the opportunity to place a memory flower on Easter Sunday for that special person you wish to remember. Donation slips can be found in the Sunday bulletin. Several azalea plants will be purchased with the remainder of the funds collected going to a special project chosen by the Mission and Outreach Committee. Plans for Palm Sunday through to Easter services are being formulated. There will be a Maundy Thursday potluck supper on March 24 at 6:00 PM. For your information, buns and dessert will be supplied. A signup sheet will be placed in the narthex of the church and in the auditorium.

The Good Friday service will be at 10:30 am, March 25. Easter Sunday Service will be at the usual time. We are looking forward to seeing what our choir Director, Bill Sgrazzutti, has in store for special music. Thanks Bill and the choir for all your work at making services so meaningful. Special thanks to Rodolfo Omolida for his music ministry each Sunday at First.

The Lenten season colours of purple are in place in the sanctuary until Good Friday when all colour is removed. Easter Sunday, the colour is White and remains so until Pentecost, at which

time red is added to the chancel table and the pulpit.
