#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

My busy year as Moderator continues. I am so grateful for the patience and flexibility shown by the leadership and people of First Church. You are putting up with all my comings and goings and allowing me space to do things a little differently when needed. Our plans for the beginning of the Season of Lent this year are a perfect example.

For the last two years we have started Lenten Season with an Ash Wednesday Service on the Wednesday before the first Sunday in Lent. This year, Ash Wednesday falls on February 26<sup>th</sup>, and the first Sunday in Lent is March 1st. However, without realising the significance of the date, I planned a Moderator trip to Ontario for that week where I will be leading a workshop on ecumenism at the Crieff Hills Retreat Centre on the Thursday morning and, as a result, I will need to be on a plane on Ash Wednesday.

In light of this, I suggested to Session that perhaps we could observe Ash Wednesday a little earlier – on Sunday, February 23<sup>rd</sup> – and Session agreed. Session also agreed it would be appropriate this year to mark the final “celebration” prior to Lent – namely “Pancake Tuesday” or “Mardi Gras” – several days ahead of “Ash Wednesday,” passing a motion to hold a Pancake Breakfast on Sunday morning, February 23, before our worship service. The Pancake Breakfast will be held from 9 – 10 am that day. I think it’s going to be both a fun and a meaningful Sunday morning at First Church!

If you have never attended an Ash Wednesday Service then a good opportunity to experience it will be on Sunday morning, February 23. I hope you will find it to be a helpful way to move into a season of prayer, repentance, and preparation for Easter. Here is a brief introduction:

#### The Meaning of Lent

Easter, the high point of the Christian year, is a time of joyous celebration. Lent, the season of

40 days leading up to Easter, is more sombre. It is a time for reflection and learning, a season of soul-searching and repentance.

Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, a time when the faithful rededicated themselves and when converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism. By observing the forty days of Lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days. Lent has been observed in the Church since apostolic times.

The word “Lent” come from “lencten,” an old Anglo-Saxon word meaning “spring,” a time when the days “lengthen”. It consists of 40 days including the six Sundays before Easter (though while Sundays are “in” Lent they are not “of” Lent, as Sunday is always the day of resurrection). The liturgical colour for Lent is purple, signifying humility and penitence.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. The term “Lent” derives from a tradition in many Christian churches to use ashes to make the sign of a cross on the forehead of a Christian to symbolize repentance and grieving.

It is preceded by Shrove Tuesday when Christians have traditionally prepared pancakes. This is an old tradition in which Christians gave up meat for Lent and used the last of the animal fat to make pancakes. (“Shrove” means to hear confession of sins and pronounce forgiveness.) You may also know Shrove Tuesday by the name Fat Tuesday, Mardi Gras, or Carnival (Latin for “farewell to meat”). In many countries this day has become a last fling before the solemnity of Lent.



### **LENTEN BOOK STUDY**

#### **Presbyterians Journeying Through Lent Together**

In Lent 2020, Presbyterians across the country are invited to join a denomination-wide book study on N.T. Wright's *Lent for Everyone, Matthew, Year A*. Using thoughtfully prepared weekly study guides, Presbyterians will journey through Lent reflecting on what it means to be kingdom-people who participate in the new life that Jesus has brought.

Jesus' proclamation throughout his ministry that "the Kingdom of Heaven is Near" has often been mistakenly interpreted as Jesus coming to "tell people how to get to heaven." In truth, what Jesus was demonstrating through his presence and his teaching was that "heaven has come near to us," or, as N.T. Wright explains, "the God of heaven and earth was coming to earth to establish his sovereign saving rule." (147) Wright invites readers to explore this truth through Matthew's telling of the Gospel story.

Through close readings of the lectionary texts for each day during Lent, Wright draws us into the biblical scenes as they unfolded, revealing more and more about what it means that Jesus is King and Lord, not just 'in heaven' but on earth as well.

In this study, we will follow the pattern Wright establishes in his daily devotions of focusing both on how Jesus' first followers would have heard this message, and what it means for those of us who are hearing the message more than 2000 years later. We will look closely at the events of Jesus' life from birth to death and resurrection, not just as a faithful account of what happened in the past but, as Wright explains, as a "clue for how we should be living as followers of the risen Christ today." (151)

#### **How to Take Part**

We will be ordering about 15 copies of the book so that those who wish may participate in this Lenten Study. You are welcome to make a donation to the church to cover the cost of your book (about \$15). You may read and reflect independently, join in the online Facebook discussion group with Presbyterians from across the country, and/or attend three discussion evenings at First Church on Tuesdays, March 17, March 31, and April 7 at 7:30 pm in the Morris Room.

### **A BRIEF THEOLOGY OF VALENTINE'S DAY**

Before Hallmark, before long-stemmed roses delivered to your door or your desk, before heart-shaped boxes of chocolates with embossed “flavor maps” - there was St. Valentine. Actually, there may have been two. The history's pretty murky, and includes legends about an early Christian priest (or was it a bishop?) martyred for (perhaps?) surreptitiously helping Christians to wed. So uncertain are the details, in fact, that in 1969 the Roman Catholic Church officially discontinued liturgical veneration of St. Valentine, though he's still on the list of recognized saints.

But the holiday lives on. It turns out Chaucer, of all people, may be the reason why: the late-medieval poet penned “Parliament of Foules” sometime around 1375, including a link -

embellished by more than a little poetic license - between courtly love and St. Valentine's feast day. February 14, Chaucer wrote, is the day birds come together to find a mate: "*For this was sent on Seynt Valentyne's day / Whan every foul cometh ther to choose his mate.*" A lovely day indeed - and as the poem's fame spread, so did the day's association with affection, both avian and human.

But however fanciful these various legends may be, there's a deeper wisdom beneath the whimsy. For centuries in Christian thought, the most prestigious book in the Bible, the "graduate school" of Christian spirituality, wasn't Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John, or the Book of Genesis, or the Psalms. It was the Song of Songs, an ancient - and pretty racy! - romantic poem about love in a world fraught with danger. Over the centuries, the poem was interpreted as an unsurpassed figurative portrait of the love between God and God's people.

Not that God's love for us is sexual; rather, the idea is that the intensity, intimacy, and delight of sexual love can be a kind of window, a sacramental parable, for understanding God's love. Divine love is tender and kind, immersive and ecstatic, full of longing and delight. It's vulnerable, beautiful, gentle, and strong.

No doubt St. Valentine would approve :)

So, this Valentine's Day, think of all the love in your life - the love you feel and the love you witness; even the love among the birds of the air! - as a glimpse of God's care for all creation. And if you're especially perceptive (or especially mischievous), you can glimpse divine love even in places as ordinary as a sweet little greeting card, an arrangement of flowers, or a "flavor map" embossed on a heart-shaped lid.

If we have eyes to see and ears to hear, the truth about God's love is that it's all around us, the Song of all songs, the Symphony of all symphonies, echoing everywhere.
