FUNDSCRIP

Thanks to all who placed an order for FundScrip this month. We received over \$4000 in orders and we also ordered some to have on hand for sale. So our total order was high enough that we got free shipping and **we earned \$180 for the church**! That's wonderful!

We won't be placing orders in July and August, but **we will take orders Sunday, Sept 8** (to avoid the long weekend) and the first Sunday in October and November.

Beginning in September, there will be a FundScrip table at coffee time in the gym. If you would like to purchase a grocery or gas card, we will have them available for purchase. Remember that it costs you nothing extra to participate. For \$50 you get a gift card worth \$50, but FundScrip gives a percentage back to the church. It's a win-win!

During the summer, you can still purchase grocery and gas gift cards by visiting Shirley in the church office (Monday – Thursday mornings during the summer.)

Another easy way to participate is to set up your own account, order cards and have them mailed to your home address.

Currently the cost of lettermail is covered, so you get it delivered free!

1. Go to the FundScrip website: fundscrip.com

2. Create your own account. Be sure to enter the Invitation code for First Church - 86MLRU

That way, First Church will get credit for your purchases.

3. Shop for the cards you wish to purchase. You need to order between \$200 and \$400 and no more than 4 cards, but you can place multiple orders!

4. When you go to Checkout it will show that First Presbyterian Church is the beneficiary. **Be Sure** to edit the Shipping (or your cards will be shipped to First Church!)

Click on Edit and choose Direct Shipping. Then enter your home address. Select Lettermail from the options.

5. Choose a payment method. The easiest and best is EFT (Electronic Funds Transfer) where it will be transferred directly from your bank, like paying with debit! Click on the link to set up your EFT. It's easy to do - just log in to your own bank account. (You may have to click on Shop then back to Checkout for it to be an available choice).

6. Click on Checkout and you will have a chance to review your order, then click on Place Order. It will show you how much the church will receive for your order.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the Anglican and United Churches Sign Lease on Nation Office Space, 300 Bloor St. West in Toronto is under construction, with a move-in date planned for 2026.



It's official! The United, Anglican, and Presbyterian churches have signed leases to share national office space at the redeveloped site of Bloor Street United Church at 300 Bloor St. West in Toronto. The agreement reflects the churches' ongoing commitment to nurturing ecumenical relationships and cooperation, reducing costs, and lessening their carbon footprint. "We've marked a formal agreement between the Presbyterian Church, the United Church, and the Anglican Church of Canada as we prepare to move in together in shared office space in a couple of years," says the Reverend Victor Kim "I'm very excited about the possibilities of what this partnership will produce in the years to come. A happy day for all of us!"



The Venerable Alan Perry, General Secretary of the Anglican Church of Canada; the Reverend Victor Kim, Principal Clerk at The Presbyterian Church in Canada; and the Rev. Michael Blair, General Secretary of The United Church of Canada, met at the construction site to see the project's progress and offer prayers of blessing for the safety and well-being of the construction workers.

"This opportunity to be together in this space came out of a relationship and conversation. We are excited about the possibility of the relationship and working together, with a commitment to ministry," said the Rev. Dr. Blair, General Secretary of The United Church of Canada. "We collaborate to be witnesses in the healing of God's world. So, I am excited and grateful for the possibilities."

Located in downtown Toronto's Annex-University of Toronto neighbourhood, the development includes a refurbished Bloor Street United Church and office, community, commercial, and worship spaces. The floor plans reflect a more efficient and flexible use of physical space for the new offices and were drafted with input from all three denominations. The three denominations' archives will also move to the new national office building and be shared, along with meeting and video spaces. "The possibility of better ecumenical collaboration in this space will also allow us to make more effective use of our financial and human resources," said Archdeacon Perry. "Being so close to good public transit allows for easy access to visitors to our offices and means we will have less impact on the environment."

Besides being a practical solution for resource optimization, the shared space is also a tangible expression of the denominations' commitment to collaboration, greater impact in the public space, and increasing the ability to innovate and share ideas between denominations.

THE MOST IMPORTANT THING THAT HAPPENED AT GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2024

I was happy to serve as a commissioner to the 2024 General Assembly from June 2-6th in Waterloo, Ontario. As you may know, the General Assembly is the annual meeting of the highest court (governing body) of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Each year, local presbyteries commission one out of every six ministers on their roll, along with an equal number of elders to participate in the discernment and decision making of our denomination as a whole.

Compared to the high stress General Assembly of 2019 when I was serving as the Moderator and we were making decisions about controversial and important topics related to human sexuality, the 2024 General Assembly was relaxed, positive, and hopeful. A highlight for me was the chance to sit together with other Former Moderators for the opening worship on Sunday evening. Specifically, I enjoyed connecting with the Rev. Dr. Jean Morris (Moderator in 2005) and Rev. Linda Bell (the first woman to be Moderator in 1992). Six out of the eight women who have served as Moderator of the General Assembly were present that evening as we heard a thoughtful reflection from the outgoing Moderator, the Rev. Mary Fontaine, and then elected and installed the current Moderator, the Rev. Dr. Patricia Dutcher-Walls.

There were many interesting items on the agenda of the meeting, and Pat (my former professor of Hebrew Bible at Knox College) did an excellent job of leading us through the Assembly. But I think that most commissioners would agree with my assessment that the most important thing that happened during the Assembly was the adoption and presentation of *The Apology of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for its Complicity in Colonization and the Residential School System.* I was one of the members appointed to the committee that prepared the apology, so I was deeply involved in the process, moved the recommendations from the committee, and participated in the presentation of the apology after it was approved.

Here's how the events of Wednesday afternoon at General Assembly were described by PCC Communications staff:

Following the adoption of the apology of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for its complicity in colonization and in operating residential schools on Tuesday, June 4, the Special Committee Regarding an Apology for Residential Schools and Colonization brought a quiet stillness and introspection to the gathering with a sacred smudging ceremony in which the committee members participated. The deeply moving ceremony was followed by singing and prayers, led by Stewart Laughing Bear Folster, a member of the National Indigenous Ministries Council (NIMC) and the past Moderator and convener of the NIMC, the Rev. Mary Fontaine. Members of the special committee took turns reading the preamble to the Apology, after which the Moderator of the 2024 General Assembly, the Rev. Dr. Pat Dutcher-Walls, read the Apology in full. The committee then invited the Assembly to participate in a smudging ceremony.

Most of you will be aware that the PCC made a Confession to God and to Aboriginal People for our participation in Residential Schools back in 1994. However, it was noted that we have learned a great deal about the impact of what our church did over the last 30 years. We are much more aware of the devastating effects of colonization and the intergenerational and ongoing trauma caused by the schools. We also noticed that our 1994 Confession didn't actually use the words "I'm sorry," nor was the Confession shared adequately with many of the Survivors and their families that needed to hear it.

The renewed Apology is detailed and honest about the Church's mistakes and the harm caused. It is intended to be shared with Indigenous people in our communities, but should be shared very carefully with great caution so that it does not cause further harm by naming these difficult things. The committee that wrote the apology is continuing to work over the next year to provide guidance for how to share the apology in a good way, and to encourage Presbyterians to read it, learn about our history, and engage more deeply in the work of healing and reconciliation.

The Church is deeply grateful to the Indigenous members of the committee who shared their wisdom and experience to help us express what needed to be said. It was a privilege to walk with them and to share in the honest and vulnerable work of apologizing for our wrongdoing.

THE APOLOGY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA FOR ITS COMPLICITY IN COLONIZATION AND THE RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL SYSTEM

Introduction

We, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, humbly offer this apology to the generations of Indigenous people and communities harmed by the residential schools and day schools we operated.

We originally made a Confession in 1994 for our role in operating residential schools and colonization but we have realized the inadequacy of that Confession. We apologize for our slowness and the apathy of our response. We are deeply sorry.

We acknowledge the families whose children were taken to schools without telling their families where the children were being taken and who never returned, who remain lost today. We acknowledge with grief the many unmarked graves that have been found and will be found, including at schools that we ran. We remember the children who never made it home.

We apologize for the impact of the genocide of colonization, forced assimilation and racism to which we actively contributed.

Many Survivors and intergenerational Survivors have shared very personal and traumatic experiences in the context of Truth and Reconciliation Commission hearings and within the congregations, committees and governing bodies of the church. We acknowledge the strength and courage of Survivors for sharing your experiences in the schools and the heavy burdens you, your families and communities still bear. We acknowledge the pain and difficulty of sharing and reliving the truth of your lived experience.

We acknowledge that the church's apology itself, as well as the presence of church representatives making the apology, may be triggering, evoking trauma for some by surfacing memories of devastating experiences in residential schools.

Apology

We acknowledge that Indigenous children suffered at residential schools. The Presbyterian Church in Canada ran Ahousaht Residential School in British Columbia, Alberni Residential School in British Columbia, Birtle Residential School in Manitoba, Cecilia Jeffrey Residential School in Shoal Lake, Ontario, Cecilia Jeffrey Residential School in Kenora, Ontario, Crowstand Residential School in Saskatchewan, File Hills Residential School in Saskatchewan, Muscowpetung (later known as "Lakesend") Residential School in Saskatchewan, Portage la Prairie Residential School in Manitoba, Regina Industrial School in Saskatchewan, Round Lake Residential School in Saskatchewan and Stoney Plain Residential School in Alberta.

We apologize for taking children from their homes, parents, grandparents and communities. We apologize for traumatizing parents and communities and taking away their rights to protect their children.

We honour and respect the languages of the land and apologize for punishing Indigenous students for speaking their traditional languages.

We apologize for attempting to eliminate Indigenous identity and Cultural and Spiritual traditions.

We apologize for the abuse Indigenous children suffered, including physical, sexual, psychological, emotional and Spiritual abuses.

We apologize for the weaponization of food that happened in the schools and for non-consensual experiments with food, nutrition and medical procedures that were conducted on children.

We apologize for the lost lives, for children who died while at residential schools – from disease, neglect, suicide, attempts to run away and from violence by teachers, staff and volunteers.

We apologize that the schools created an isolated and unsafe environment where violence was condoned and students learned violence. We regret, and are deeply sorry, that we provided conditions where students could abuse other students.

We acknowledge and apologize for the resulting loss of bloodlines, of ancestors and of people who would not grow to become Elders, the huge loss of culture and future for nations this meant.

We apologize that when children died their parents were not always informed, they were not always returned to their communities and their burial sites were sometimes unmarked or the markers were not maintained and the record of names was not kept.

We apologize for the church's attitude of white superiority, for its assimilating policies and practices, for the racism of treating Indigenous people as less than human and for the ongoing intergenerational effects of our complicity with colonization and the schools that continue to negatively impact families and communities.

We acknowledge that this systemic racism continues to impact Indigenous people, including through: insecure housing; poverty; forced dependence on social assistance; experiencing lateral and domestic violence, in particular toward Indigenous women, girls and 2SLGBTQ people as named in the final report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. We acknowledge this has led to hopelessness, mental health crises and the tragedy of suicide, barriers to completing education and to accessing health care. We acknowledge this has led to the breakdown of family bonds that results in children taken into foster care, gang involvement, exploitation, addictions and incarceration.

We are sorry for how long it has taken for The Presbyterian Church in Canada to begin to understand the depth of harm we have caused, and we still have much to learn.

For our complicity in colonization and the residential school system, we are deeply, deeply sorry.

We therefore offer five fundamental commitments:

We will continue to listen and learn from Indigenous people, leaders, Elders and Knowledge Keepers, welcoming and engaging voices from both within and beyond The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

We will continue the work of reconciliation, responding to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's 94 Calls to Action and the work of reparation that we have begun.

We will respect traditional Indigenous spiritual practices.

We will listen to and tell the truth about the past.

We will work to support Indigenous-led healing and wellness initiatives and be in solidarity with Indigenous people and communities.
