MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Do you see the light at the end of the tunnel? I think I am beginning to see it! Although we still have further to go towards a full recovery from the Covid-19 Pandemic, I am beginning to see signs of hope. Infection rates in Regina and Saskatchewan are starting to go down. More and more people are getting vaccinated (about 66% of Saskatchewan people 40 years and up at the time of writing this). Visits to care homes will soon be a possibility again. Restrictions on gathering sizes will be reduced in the coming weeks. All this is prompting me to look forward to the day when we can welcome everyone back to in-person worship, fellowship, and service in the church building.

When the Session met this week, we decided to continue our current practice of worshipping online through the month of May, and we will evaluate the situation once again in the first week of June. However, I am quite confident that changes will be coming and new opportunities for gathering will come, particularly as people get their second doses of the vaccine this summer. I am looking forward to seeing you all in person once again!

The other light at the end of the tunnel that I am seeing is the end of my extended term as Moderator of the General Assembly. The 2021 General Assembly will take place on June 6-9 in an online format, and after preaching at the opening worship and then installing the next moderator during the first sederunt (first session of the assembly) I will become the Past - Moderator.

Commissioners to the Assembly from the Presbytery of Assiniboia will be Jo Szostak (elder commissioner) and me (minister commissioner). Gabe Omolida will be participating in the Assembly as a Young Adult Representative for our presbytery. The reports were published online this week, so we are busily reading and considering the recommendations on many different topics of

interest and importance to the church and its life, ministry, and mission. You are also welcome to read any of the reports that may be of interest to you. You can find them at <https://presbyterian.ca/gao/ga2021/>

Although there are many interesting reports to consider, I would particularly commend to you the final report of the Rainbow Communion. This special committee was appointed by the 2017 General Assembly to lead a listening process to hear the stories of harm done to LGBTQI people within The Presbyterian Church in Canada, as well as the stories of grace experienced in the church. It is a long report that shares many stories that were heard, as well as recommended actions for the church as a whole and various bodies of the church to confess the harm done, provide support and care for those wounded, to turn in a new direction, and become a more welcoming and loving community of faith.

If you do read the Rainbow Communion's report, be prepared for some difficult and heart-wrenching experiences to be shared. In the coming months I will be interested in your reflections on the report, as well as your thoughts about how First Church may be called to respond to the recommendations for congregations.

I also ask that you pray for the 2021 General Assembly as we meet to consider all the important and urgent business of the church. Please pray for the Commissioners and the Young Adult Representatives, for the Moderator and Clerks, the Staff of the PCC, and all those involved in facilitating a very different kind of Assembly in an online format. Please pray that the Holy Spirit will guide us, granting us wise discernment and love for one another, for the church, and for the world.

You are invited to join the General Assembly's opening worship service on Sunday, June 6th at 12:00 pm (2:00 pm EDT). Details about how to participate online will be forthcoming. Please

note that Session has decided there will be no morning worship service at 10:30 am on that day, and invites all members and adherents of First Church to join the General Assembly's worship service.

SESSION

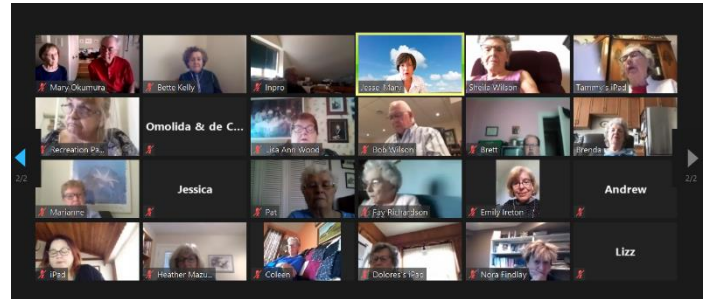

Annual Congregational Meeting First Church held its annual congregational meeting by Zoom on May 2. There were 36 people in attendance. It was a productive meeting with a celebration of the past year and approval of the budget for this year. In spite of the pandemic, the congregation was busy in 2020. LOVE MY NEIGHBOUR



On Friday, April 16th I became eligible, based on my age, to receive a vaccination to protect against COVID-19. Like many Gen-X Canadians, I had been cheering for several months as I watched the older generations of my friends and congregation members getting immunized. I “loved” every social media post about someone getting vaccinated, and I shared all the latest news about clinics and eligibility in my province. I

was overjoyed when my sister (a front-line health worker) got the jab, and relieved when my parents, and then finally my husband, “Stuck it to COVID” just a week before my turn came up.

On the day of my eligibility, I sat impatiently through several church meetings on Zoom, and then hopped in my car and went straight to the drive-through clinic not far from my home in Regina. It was a bit of a wait. I drove into a lane as directed, and then sat there for about an hour and a half. It felt just like the line-up of cars waiting to get onto a ferry. I rolled down the windows, enjoyed the sunshine and the breeze, and worked on a sermon until my lane began to move. Then followed about an hour of inching along towards the big garage doors of the clinic.

The nurse who vaccinated me was very friendly and professional – asking me lots of questions, explaining the possible side effects, and making sure I knew where I should wait my 15 minutes afterwards in my car, and put on my hazard lights if I didn't feel well and needed help. The jab itself felt just like my annual flu shot, but it meant so much more.



The next day I was exhausted, a bit headachy, and my arm was pretty sore. I knew to expect a few minor side effects, but I was surprised by the flood of emotions that I experienced. A deep sense of relief, like I'd been holding my breath for a year and finally I could breathe freely. An amazing feeling of gratitude, having received a long-awaited and much-desired gift. And I wouldn't say that the third emotion was guilt, but it was a real awareness of privilege.

I thought about younger people who were still waiting, people without vehicles who could not go to the drive-through clinic and would wait longer to access a vaccine, and essential workers whose turn still hadn't come up. I also thought about people around the world - those in

countries without the financial resources to buy vaccines, those in places where outbreaks are totally out of control and medical services are severely limited.

I felt like one of those ten people with leprosy who was healed by Jesus – the one who turned back, praising God with a loud voice, the one who lay down at Jesus’ feet and thanked him profusely. I’ve often wondered about that story, about what that thankful person did after Jesus sent him on his way. I can picture him telling the story of his healing again and again with excitement and joy. I can imagine him encountering other sick people and pointing them towards Jesus for help and hope.

But the more important question is what I will do in response to the free gift of my COVID-19 vaccination. Certainly, I will continue to give thanks to God for the amazing gift that I have received. I will continue to encourage others to get vaccinated as soon as their turn comes up – protecting their own health, protecting vulnerable people around them, and protecting our society as a whole from all the devastating effects of the ongoing pandemic.

In deep gratitude for the gift of being vaccinated, my husband and I have each given \$250 to the [Love My Neighbour project](#) to help UNICEF provide COVID-19 vaccines to the world’s most vulnerable people. “Love My Neighbour” is a national movement for global vaccine equity, inspired by Millennium Kids and Canadian faith communities, to raise funds to help increase equitable access and delivery of COVID-19 vaccines. Each gift of \$25 provides funding to fully vaccinate a person who would not otherwise have access to this life-saving immunization. This includes vaccines, per-person cost for transport, cold chain protection, health worker training, and disposal of needles and waste.

If you also feel thankful and privileged to have access to vaccinations and the hope of a COVID-free community, I invite you also to turn back like the healed man did. Give thanks and praise to God, tell the story, encourage others,

and consider gifting a vaccine to someone else who needs it too.

India is currently in the midst of a dramatic surge in COVID-19 cases, threatening its healthcare system and leaving already vulnerable families in crisis. Immediate needs are access to health care, medical supplies, and medicines, particularly oxygen. There is an urgent need to educate people on risk prevention and to address vaccine hesitancy. Vaccine supply is insufficient and inaccessible to many, leaving herd immunity out of reach.
